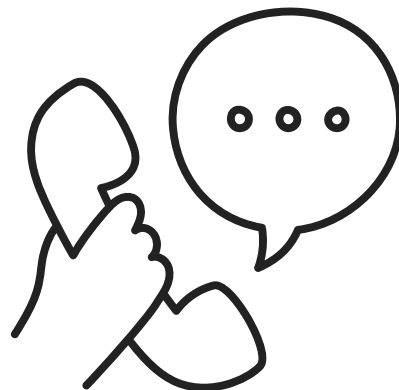

What Happens During a CPS Investigation?

- A CPS worker will try to contact you to discuss the complaint.
 - The CPS worker may come to your home or call you by phone.
 - The CPS worker may call family members, neighbors, doctors, and teachers for information.
 - If the CPS worker cannot reach you, they may try to speak with your child at school.
 - If CPS is satisfied that no abuse or neglect has taken place, there is no further action.
 - If CPS finds evidence of abuse or neglect, additional steps are taken, including possible court action.

What Are My Rights in a CPS Investigation?

- You have the right to know the details of the allegation made against you.
- You have the right to speak with an attorney before speaking with CPS.
- You have the right to refuse CPS entrance to your home without a court order.
- You have the right to keep your immigration status private.
- You have the right to an interpreter if one is needed.
- You have the right to refuse mental health or drug test evaluation without a court order.
- You have the right to refuse to have CPS question your children without a court order.
- You have the right to refuse services recommended by CPS.
